You just were greeted a Happy New year in 15 languages, including Italian, Russian, Eskimo, Chinese, Vietnamese, French, Arabic, Hebrew among others. But unless you speak or could read those languages you did not know what the message was, until it was printed in English, your native language.

This has long been a challenge of Christians and missionaries, and that is how to spread the Gospel to people that do not speak our language. As of October, 2017, the entire Bible has been translated into 670 languages and the New Testament alone into 1521. This has been done to reach people around the globe and give the message of the Gospel to all. In addition to languages there are many other challenges that today's Church faces with getting "the message" out. Some involve how the message is delivered.

I rejoice that our church is using old and new creative ways to reach people with the Gospel. Musical cantatas have long been a way we have delivered the message, along with Vacation Bible School, and Bible Studies. More creative ways have been the Pioneer Harvest Dinner and the Harvest Festival, and even more creative and tech savvy has been our Electronic Sign, The Church Website, Targeted mailing, Online Streaming, and Facebook Live of our church services and the Christmas Light Show.

If we are to make a difference in the community, I feel we have to continue looking for new ways to connect with them. As great an idea or method as any of these are, the conventional time-proven method of personally inviting someone to church and being able to give your testimony along with just making people feel welcome and amongst friends when they attend church is the most personal and powerful. May we each do our part as we strive to reach more people this year at FBCO.
