It was missed by the ear of the most important person of all.

A church that is doing God's Will is made up of many people with a multitude of talents. As humans we seem to put degrees of importance on certain positions or people in the church because of their duties but I'm not so sure God sees it that way. Everyone has a gift from God and when we are using it in His service, God's Will is being done, and when we don't, the church is not meeting the full potential that God desires for us.
