JOHN'S JOTS

Easter is a time of such HOPE. And hope is so needed in our world today. As we navigate these uncharted waters of Covid-19 and shelter in place, we are hearing daily of more cases, more deaths, and more

uncertainty. That uncertainty is very uncomfortable because we are anxious about where we go, who we see, and *social distance*. Forced isolation is so contrary to our experience in the family of God, and we miss the ability to come together, be together, and worship together. I really miss the comfort of loving hugs and shaking hands!! But God demonstrated His power over death and the grave on that first Easter morning. And we find HOPE in His power over this pandemic, as well.

Each year at Easter, we joyfully celebrate the reality that Jesus IS alive—I like to call that perpetual present tense. What a blessed assurance! That means His love is just as strong today, His grace is just as sufficient today, His presence is just as real today—because HE IS ALIVE. Of course, we celebrate that our Lord Jesus IS alive every week (that is why we worship on Sunday instead of the Sabbath on Saturday), but Easter Sunday is a very special time of reflecting and rejoicing. Our celebration of Easter abounds in the wonderful discovery that HE IS RISEN—RISEN INDEED!!

Plan to join us on Easter Sunday morning as we reflect and rejoice. And you may literally be able to do that. With the assistance of Jim Boxx and Tony Pezzo, we have been able to broadcast our worship each Sunday morning through our website and Facebook. Last Sunday, we had over 60 log-ins on our Church's Facebook page. Many of those were families, not just individuals. An that

number does not include many who watched the live feed through our website, and those who were in *watch parties* through our Facebook live stream. Each Sunday, we are able to minister in worship to a host of folks. Thank you to Jim and Tony, and all the others who are making our weekly worship broadcast possible. We will continue doing that as long as necessary, until we can be physically at Church together.

But what about being together on Easter? With Jim and Tony giving technical support, we may celebrate Easter together by having a Drive-In Worship Service. Weather permitting, you can come to Church and remain in your cars on the parking lot. You can then tune your radio to a FM station in your car. Our praise team will perform on the front porch, and I will preach from the sidewalk. You will be able to share in the entire service on your radio. (Can I get a honking AMEN?!) We still won't be able to shake hands or hug, but by remaining in your car, you will be safely and socially distant. We are still working out the logistics, but hopefully, we can be together for that wonderful worship celebration.

Our Maundy Thursday service was to be on April 9th in our Worship Center. It is the symbolic memorial meal that Jesus shared with His disciples in the Upper Room the night before He was crucified for our sinful condition. That night, Jesus gave the Passover symbols a whole new meaning and offered the cup of the New Covenant with us. We will try to share that experience with you by live stream. Let us eat that bread and drink that cup in remembrance of Him.
