A welcome addition for all of us baseball fans. In honor of this event, I have chosen to reprint a newsletter article I did over 5 yrs ago and got some positive feedback from. It is the summer rerun season you know.

As I left the 6th Annual Pioneer Harvest Dinner Friday evening, I was saddened by the passing of Ernie Banks affectionately known as "Mr Cub". Even though Mr. Banks played his entire 19 yr career for the loathed Cubbies from the Northside of Chicago, I along with baseball fans everywhere respected not only his skills as a Hall of Fame baseball player and a great competitor, but how he conducted his life, and the enthusiasm and positive disposition he always shared. I was fortunate to see him play against the Cardinals, and I remember watching him in the old Busch Stadium. He hit two homers in one game off of Cardinal pitcher Steve Carlton, 6-29-1970, with my grandparents and family. He is to Chicago what Stan "The Man" Musial is to St. Louis and they had several similarities.

Both were great homerun hitters and Hall of Fame baseball players. Both received the Congressional Medal of Freedom. Both were known for their great outlook on life. They epitomized the concept of Fair Play, Integrity and Honesty. Both were never thrown out of a game. Ernie Banks was one of the first men of color to play in the major leagues, breaking into baseball in 1953, and he experienced a lot of the racial prejudices and segregation that ball players of that era where challenged with. But with the help of his mentor Buck O Neil, he always kept his positive outlook.

Some of his famous quotes were Its a beautiful day for a ballgame. Lets play 2. Work? I never worked a day in my life. I always loved what I was doing. Had a passion for it. Loyalty and friendship, which to me is the same, created all the wealth I ever thought I would have. When I wake up in the morning, I feel like a billionaire without paying the taxes. And, The only way to prove you are a good sport is to lose.

His other famous nickname is "Mr Sunshine", which reminds me of Ephesians 4:29 which states: Let no corrupting talk come out of your mouths, for only such is good for building up, as fits the occasion, that it may give grace to those that hear. and 1 Thessalonians 5:11, Therefore encourage one another and build one another up, just as you are doing. May we all strive to be encouragers and sunshine in the world.
