

Greetings Everyone.

Have you seen or heard any political ads lately? Maybe 1 or 2.....THOUSAND!!!!. I'm sure we are all looking forward to the day when we get back to normal commercials about laundry detergent and new cars and hardware stores and the such. But that brings me to the very important topic of this article and that is it is most important for us all to exercise our American right to VOTE. Whether its in person on November 3 at a precinct or by a certified absentee or Mail-in ballot. Just VOTE.


I could go on and on about the importance of this election and its your duty to vote, but instead I will give you some fun facts about elections and voting in America and around the world. In 1872, President Grant ran against a dead man. His opponent Horace Greeley died during the election process. George Washington spent his entire campaign budget (50 pounds) on 160 gallons of liquor to serve to potential voters. In Australia, all legal age voters are required to vote, and if they fail to do so, are fined \$20.

The United States trails most developed nations in voter participation which is typically around 55%. In France, citizens are automatically registered to vote when they turn 18. Oregon is the first and only state in the US to use automatic voter registration. Some countries such as India, Greece, Ukraine and Columbia have a "None of the Above" option on their ballots. In the US, only Nevada offers this option.

It wasn't until the 1890's that secret ballots became commonly used in America. In 16 US states, it is illegal to take a photo with your ballot. Doing so can result in a fine or even jail time. In Saudi Arabia women finally won the right to vote in 2015. In 1893 New Zealand became the first country to allow women to vote. It was in 1920 for women to get the right to vote in the US. In ancient Sparta the government assembly would vote by shouting. The side who shouted the loudest would win the point. Aristotle called the practice "childish". In Texas people can vote with a gun license but not with a student ID. Approximately 64% of the United States voting-age population is registered to vote compared to 91% in Canada and the UK, 96% in Sweden, and nearly 99% in Japan. Countries with the highest voter turnouts: Vietnam 99.3% Rwanda 98.9% Laos 97.9 Singapore 93.6% Ethiopia 93.2% Malta 92.1% Australia 91% and Cuba 90.9%.

I hope you learned a thing or two about voting and elections and maybe even a chuckle as I know I did. This was shared from the website FACTRETRIEVER.com.
