A Note from John Minister of Worship John Gorse



Greetings Everyone,

FBCO Building History as I know it:

It is a very exciting time at FBCO as for the first time in many years we are entering a building program as approved in our last special business meeting. As I look back it is great to see how God has blessed FBCO from its inception. My understanding as the story is told that FBCO was meeting in the Clendenins home and some members went out to look for some ground and came upon a farm that was located on a hill at 6741 Telegraph Rd and they knocked on the door and asked if the farmer would consider selling ground for a church. He and his wife thought about it and eventually agreed that a church would be a good thing for the area and FBCO had a farmhouse and a garage and I believe 17 acres. The farmhouse was used for services and Sunday School and Training Union and RA's and GA's along with the garage for many years and they were both used for a Halloween Spook House annually that included a surgery scene and a casket that was very convincing and scary and witnessed by a very young Johnny Gorse. But I digress.

Soon after acquiring the farm and land, I believe plans were drawn up for our sanctuary building and in 1960/61 the building was started. I believe a great part of the construction costs were provided by bonds that were sold out in one afternoon. Much of the building was built by men in the church as the ladies would provide meals. A deacon by the name of Virgil Mossberger borrowed a crane from where he worked and the men of the church installed all the trusses and the steeple over a weekend for the roof. Dr Don Wideman was our pastor during this exciting time and other names that come to mind are Warren Nicely who was the architect, Millard Sadler, Norm Partney, Grayden White, my father John Gorse, Gene Crites, Mel Novell, Bob Renner, Lou Clemons, Doyne Bailey, Mr Schaffer, Bill Smith, The Nappiers, The Parkers, The Pogues, The Landes, The Lynns, The Gobles, The Sanders, The Fears, The Alexanders and the Clendenins along with many many others that I'm not remembering or not aware of. Feel free to remind me. My point being that God was providing and preparing FBCO to be the light on the hill to the surrounding Oakville area that was mostly farms of cattle and crops and open areas and 2 lane roads and probably under 5,000 people that would grow to over 36,100 as reported in the 2010 census.

It is told that these early years of the church were very harmonious and a strong sense of a working together as everyone strived to do their part in building a church building that would house the "True Church" which is God's people as they worship and teach to equip each other to be able to reach the growing community. I thank those that had the faith to seek Gods Will and step out on faith to purchase the land that FBCO sits on today. I thank all the families and men and women that worked tirelessly to build our sanctuary, many of whom have gone on to be with the Lord. Through their giving of money and sweat and toil our sanctuary has been the place where countless souls that have become Christians and followed the Lord in baptism of which I am one and my son Justin to make it personal, along with others in my family. For that I am eternally grateful to God and FBCO.

Feel free to let me know of other memories you may have of these early years of our church as I think it is always good to remember how God has provided and sustained us through the years. Next month, Building History PHASE II: We Need A Building Addition. It is so good to see both services increasing in numbers and getting to see some folks that haven't been able to attend in person in over a year. Welcome back, and hopefully the light at the end of the tunnel is that we will be resuming all of the church ministries at the end of the summer.
