# A Note from Minister of Worship John Gorse



Greetings everyone,

FBCO Building History as I know it (Continued) PHASE II: We Need a Building Addition/Sunday School Educational Wing.

We left off last month with FBCO needing to expand its building due to outgrowing its old farmhouse and garage and the sanctuary basement level that was being used for Sunday School and Training Union classes and a need for more parking. As we entered the late 60's and early 70's the existing farmhouse and garage that had served the church functionally as children and youth Sunday School rooms were becoming obsolete, as there was no a/c and heating was a challenge in the colder winter months. And aesthetically, it was very unappealing as a church facility. With that, plans were made to add a wing to the church building that would serve as Sunday School & Education Building, and demolish the farmhouse and garage.

In 1971/1972 Under the direction of Architect Bob Renner, plans were drawn up for the attached Education building, in which the lower level included new bathrooms and a relocation of the nursery that was where the current Sunday School office and Library is. It also included a church office and Pastors office and the long hall of Sunday School classrooms. The church voted on this addition and it was approved and, like had been done on the original sanctuary, some of the work provided was by men and women of the church which included some carpentry and concrete and painting. The Pastor during this building time was John King a young pastor that had graduated from Baylor University in Texas.

A side note to this time was when the farmhouse was being torn down, it was discovered that part of the house was a log cabin that had been the original building of Point School, and a historic society requested in a special called church meeting that the log cabin remain and be restored and become a historic site. The church rejected this option as the new grade for the parking lot and the new grade of Telegraph Road was 6 ft or more lower than the log cabin grade and a compromise was made to offer the log cabin to the society, so a portion of the cabin corner became an exhibit area at the newer Point School location.

As mentioned virtually the entire lower level or the building was utilized as offices and classes and a nursery area. The upper level was completely open with a state of the art smooth finish concrete floor. It soon became the home of First Baptist Church of Oakville's recreational roller hockey arena that brought in youth and adults of all ages and sizes and shapes and faiths to compete in pick up games of roller hockey. Under the coordination of Dave Renner, hockey players such as Mark Goodson, Tom Ferhman, Mike Ebert, Jeff Alexander, Don Bracey, Dave Sanders, John Fank, Kevin Kain, Darry Castor, Jim, Jeff, and Joe Bennett and myself along with scores of others spent many an afternoon and evening playing in the dimly lit *Holy Hockey House*.

In October of each year, continuing with the early church tradition at the farmhouse, the area was turned into a giant Halloween *Spookhouse*, that was very comparable with any of the community spookhouses, complete with a western hanging scene that almost hung Mark Goodson. Literally! But I digress, eventually the church offices were brought upstairs to their current location and the conference room, choir room, and bathrooms were added. Lastly the commercial kitchen and Activities Center area and stage was finished off, which ended all roller hockey games. Its exciting to see how God has blessed us and brought FBCO from a farmhouse on a hill to the great worship center it is today, and looking forward to the new *Welcome Center* addition. Hope to see you all in the church services in person and online.
